Iowa is also one of only three states in the nation with a single-factor corporate income tax, based only on in-state sales.

Other business benefits offered by lowa include:

- No property tax on inventory.
- Right-to-work state.
- 50 percent deduction of federal income tax paid on lowa sales.
- No sales and use taxes on manufacturing machinery and equipment; computers and packaging containers sold to retailers or manufacturers; or pollution control equipment.
- Local property tax on machinery and equipment assessed at 30 percent net acquisition cost.

- Unemployment insurance for new manufacturers averages \$119 per employee.
   Workers' compensation for the average lowa manufacturer is \$2.62 per \$100 of payroll. Of the 10 states surveyed, lowa's rate (1 percent) was the lowest.


